

# Flywheel energy storage cost per kilowatt-hour

What are flywheels & how do they work?

Flywheels are an electromechanical energy storage technology that has a short duration of only a handful of minutes, which makes them suitable for applications that only require a short time of use or that are used as backup power that can bridge between the grid and larger backup sources.

How does a kilowatt / megawatt storage system affect R&D?

While storage procurements started off on a kilowatt or megawatt basis, recent installations suggest increasing E/P ratios, which may drive research and development (R&D) toward storage systems that have high specific energies and energy densities (Ailworth 2018).

How much does electricity cost per kW?

Per International Renewable Energy Agency (IRENA 2012), the \$/kW for electrical and mechanical equipment decreases with increasing power and is estimated to be \$570/kW for a 4 MW system, \$485/kW for a 48 MW system, and \$245/kW for a 500 MW system. There appears to be an inflection point at ~ 50 MW.

What is the minimum power required for energy storage?

How long does a flywheel shutdown take?

Flywheel response time provided by vendors was determined to be 250 milliseconds from the information gathered. Lastly, for other technologies, such as PSH and CAES, the time to go from shutdown to full power can be as high as 2-10 minutes.
